Accommodation Options

Option 1:

The Sustainability Farm Project, also known as Khok Nong Na, will be hosting Home Stays for students. The accommodations are located within the farm area and are owned and managed by individuals who have their land located inside the project. These homes are constructed in large areas owned by different families, but they are close to each other. Students will have the opportunity to experience living with different families who are using sustainability philosophy for their agricultural farming. It's a great way to immerse oneself in a unique cultural experience while also learning about sustainable practices in agriculture.













Option 2:

Located up in the mountains and easily accessible, the temple campsite offers accommodation that serves as a hub for Buddhist rituals and overnight stays. While the accommodations are not luxurious, the temple provides essential equipment to ensure a comfortable stay. Students who choose to stay at the temple campsite will have the opportunity to connect directly with the raw and natural beauty that surrounds the temple, providing a unique and immersive experience.

Option 3:

The Bann Rabeng Dao Project has recently constructed new accommodations in a spacious field located behind the renowned Wat Huay Pla Kang temple. Guests can explore the nearby areas while traveling in traditional wooden carts, which is a unique feature of this accommodation.

Although hot water is available, the accommodations operate under an eco-friendly concept and provide limited electricity for primary uses only. The main power system for this accommodation is solar, which aligns with their commitment to sustainable practices.









Day to Day

Day 1

Students will be collected from the airport and taken to their accommodation. After swiftly unpacking they will visit the Elephant Peace Project, where they will attend an information session and prepare food for the elephants. They will also clean, repair, and enhance the campsite. Lunch will be provided in the city on the way to the accommodation, whereas dinner will be provided at the accommodation.

Day 3

Students will visit the Sustainable Farm
Project to learn about flood problemsolving, drought management, and
utilizing natural resources for
sustainability. After receiving lunch at the
farm, students will take part in a survival
challenge that includes hiking and
preparing their own dinner in a serene
environment with the assistance of local
guides. This challenge will teach them
valuable life lessons
such as perseverance,
self-reliance,
teamwork,
and flexibility.

Day 2

Students will spend the morning at the Elephant Peace Project, feeding, caring for, and bathing elephants, and learning about their behavior. After lunch at the sanctuary, students will engage in community service activities at the temple, cleaning, repairing, and improving the temple and nearby areas, as well as learning about the forest and its inhabitants. They will also visit nearby hot springs. The day's learning objectives include building responsibility, leadership, and teamwork, extending learning beyond the classroom, and caring for other people and animals.

Day 4

Breakfast will be served at the accommodation after which students will participate in a community service project building a Check Dam. Through community service activities, students will learn about social responsibility, enhancing their social skills, and developing a sense of service to others and their community. According to research by Afzal & Hussain (2020, p.55), community service volunteering has a positive impact on self-awareness and good citizenship. Lunch will be served at the community service site, and dinner back at the accommodation.



Day to Day

Day 5

Students will first visit Tham Luang, where the Wild Boar football team was trapped in 2018. The visit offers valuable lessons in leadership, teamwork, problem-solving, positive thinking, and hope. Next, students will visit the Golden Triangle, an area where the borders of Thailand, Laos, and Myanmar converge. They will learn about the challenges associated with drug trafficking in the region and the impact it has on local communities. Students will also visit the House of Opium Museum to learn about the history of the opium trade and examine fascinating artifacts representing the unique beliefs, cultures, traditions, and imagination of the Burmese, Shan, Chinese, and tribal groups in Thailand. The day will conclude with a Bonfire Party, where students will enjoy local food, perform acts, and receive their Week Without Walls certificate.

Day 6

Students will have breakfast at the accommodation before visiting two temples: Wat Rong Khun (The white temple) and Wat Huay Pla Kang. Lunch will be provided at Wat Huay Pla Kang. After lunch, students will be transferred to the airport, signalling the end of their Week Without Walls journey.
